

King John's unsuccessful military efforts were expensive and required heavy taxes. The barons of the realm finally rebelled and in June 1215 forced the king to accept the Magna Carta or Great Charter. This charter limited the king's powers in various ways, declaring that he was not above the law. It was reissued later in several modified versions. The chart below shows descents from two of the 25 barons who were sureties, responsible for guaranteeing that the king followed the charter.



William de Huntingfield, Knight, of Huntingfield, Suffolk.

William Malet of Curry Mallet, Somerset.

Richard Basset, Knt.; b. ca. 1274. He was continually employed in the Scottish wars and was summoned to Parliament as Ricardo Basset de Weledon. He was taken prisoner at the Battle of Bannockburn in 1314 and died less than two months later.


